Curry Co. Bank Shows Gain During Past Year

Annual stockholders meeting of Curry County Bank was held January 9, at Gold Beach.

Cashier C. H. Young reported a successful year, with deposits increasing \$200,000, which reflects a larger increase in individual balances in view of withdrawals by the government of war loan deposits.

Loans increased \$188,000, which reflects greater business activity in the county and aggressive action to take care of all the legitimate credit needs of the area.

Directors were re-elected, with exception of Major Grant J. Williams who has been in active service for several years and unable to serve longer. Vernon F. Hancam of Harbor was elected director to fill the vacancy and to keep the board in closer touch with the needs of veterans.

Mr. Hancam was recently discharged from the navy. Bank officers were re-elected.

The management expects 1947 business to continue good in the county, with the bank to always foster best interests of the entire county.
