2 pounds ground beef.
1 No. 2 can tomatoes.
3 cups cooked kidney beans.
2 onions, minced.
1 can mushroom buttons.
Salt and pepper to taste.

Fry the onions in drippings to a golden brown and remove from pan. Also lightly cook mushrooms in butter to improve flavor. Add to onions. Brown the beef in a large frying pan. Add onions, mushrooms, tomatoes and kidney beans to the meat. Season to taste and simmer 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.
