### Control Program Will Be Presented January 24

Valuable land becomes almost  
 worthless if given over to useless  
 or poisonous weeds, advises W. G.  
 Nibler, weed specialist from the  
 crops department at Oregon State  
 college, who has been scheduled  
 for Curry Coupty, Jan. 24. He  
 will present the latest informa-  
 tion on the use of new weed  
 chemicals, time of application,  
 cost and other pertinent informa-  
 tion. His schedule has been ar-  
 ranged through the county agent  
 office to meet farmers in south-

ern Curry county, Friday at 1  
 at Chetco Grange, and at 8:00  
 p. m. at Sixes Grange.

Land owners finding weeds are  
 the unknown varieties for identi-  
 fication. Selective weed control,  
 which means that some of the  
 new chemicals will kill weeds but  
 do not hurt the crop, will be ex-  
 plained. Some of these chemicals  
 even fertilize the main crop.

Phochlor, 2-4D, sodium chlor-  
 ate and other chemicals have been  
 subject to experiment station and  
 field trials under many conditions  
 so that definite recommendations  
 can now be made.

Curry county land use commit-  
 tee which is preparing a report  
 to be presented at a county-wide  
 planning meeting Feb. 18, has  
 already found rapid spread of  
 Tansley ragweed and other poi-  
 Canadian thistle, St. Johnswort,  
 sonous weeds. It is hoped that  
 sufficient interest will develop to  
 prevent the further spread of  
 these valuable land thieves.
