ELECTRO-MAGNETIC RAYS

Repair Damaged Tires



A revolutionary new method of tire repairing is demonstrated here to a tire repairman by Harold V. James, inventor of the equipment and president of the OK Rubber Welders System. Making use of new scientific developments in infra-red rays, Mr. James developed a process of welding rubber with these electro-magnetic radiations.
