

### Cooling Due All Banks Serving In Canadian Forces

### Veterans Serving With Other Allies May Be Longer in Process

Processing of applications for education by the United States citizens who served in Canadian armed forces during the war have been streamlined by the Veterans' Administration, eliminating former delays of

from three to six months, Oregon department of veterans' affairs service officers announced early this week.

"Action will be taken immediately" by the VA, a circular issued by that agency states, to process applications of American veterans of the Canadian armed forces, by securing the following evidence:

1. Certified or photostatic copy of discharged or release from active military or naval service of the Canadian government.
2. Certified copy of public record of birth, or a certified copy of church record of baptism.
3. Affidavit stating that the veteran was a citizen of the U. S. at the time of enlistment in the Canadian armed forces.
4. That he was a resident of the United States at the time of filing application.
5. That he has not applied for and received the same or similar educational benefits from the allied government with which he served during World War 2.

Local VA officials explained that the same steps will be taken to process educational benefits from veterans of all allied gov-

ernment armed forces, but that delays have been eliminated only in the case of those who fought for Canada. All other applications still must go through the central office of the VA at Washington, D. C., from there to the allied government concerned, and back again.

If the foregoing evidence is supplied by the applicant who served with Canada, however, no more delay than is encountered by the veteran of the U. S. in applying for school benefits should be necessary, the department of veterans' affairs was informed.
