

Favorite Recipe

Mrs. Dorothy Woody submits her favorite recipe:

SPAGHETTI MORE
 2 pounds ground beef.
 1 cup chopped celery
 1 can sliced mushrooms
 1½ pounds spaghetti or short macaroni
 1 can tomato soup
 1 can ripe olives
 1 can mushroom soup
 Grated yellow cheese
 1½ cups chopped onion
 1 can tomato sauce
 Garlic or garlic sals salt and pepper.
 Boil spaghetti until tender, add soups, tomato sauce. Fry celery, onions and mushrooms in shortening. Add meat and fry lightly, season. Put layer of spaghetti in baking dish, then layer of meat. Add grated cheese and olives, and another layer of spaghetti. Sprinkle dry bread crumbs on top. This amount fills two baking dishes. Bake one hour at 325 degrees. This recipe can be put into your locker or refrigerator for unexpected guests.

Kitchen Hints

In cooking a tough fowl or meat, one tablespoon of vinegar in the water will save nearly two hours of boiling.
 Vinegar removes lime spots.
 Indian meal and vinegar on hand when roughened by labor or cold will heal and soften them.
 The mica windows of coal stoves can easily be cleaned with a soft cloth dipped in vinegar and water. This should be done while putting the stove up.
 If vinegar is added to prunes while stewing them, about three tablespoons to a pound will improve the flavor.
 When cracked eggs have to be boiled a little vinegar added to the water will prevent the whites from boiling out, the acid coagulates albumen and stops the leaks.
 The cracks of eggs may be covered with a bit of paper wet with the exuding albumen. There is no glue like the white of an egg, not even boiling water will remove the paper.

CRUMB CAKE

½ cup sugar
 ½ cup chopped nuts
 ½ cup seedless raisins
 ¼ cup cracker meal
 3 eggs
 ¼ teaspoon baking powder
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 Separate eggs, beat yolks, add sugar, beat creamy; add and stir in cracked meal, baking powder, nuts and raisins; carefully fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in moderate oven 15 minutes, and when cool, cover with jam and sprinkle with finely chopped nuts. Serve portions decorated with sweetened whipped cream.

LETTER FROM WASHINGTON

This is written after I have just finished listening to three hours of heated debate on the question of whether or not the president's budget should be reduced by six billion dollars. One of the main reasons why the people took control of congress away from the new deal was that they felt the New Dealers were spending too much money. In spite of the 37½ billion budget asked by the president. A vote revealed the division is almost strictly along party lines, the Republicans voting to curtail the spending and the Democrats to continue it.

When the six billion dollar cut was first proposed, I felt that such a reduction might impair the effectiveness of our armed forces. I feel very strongly, that until peace treaties are signed and peace is actually a fact in the world, we must maintain a strong army, navy and air force. After discussing the matter with several people whom I regard as experts and after going over the figures and reading testimony given in hearings, I have reached the conclusion that the proposed budget reduction will not hurt either our world position or our national defense. We will still have a large two-ocean navy—we will have a million men under arms in the army and a substantial air force.

We must, above all things, have a financially strong country and a productive and prosperous internal economy. We cannot have either if we continue spending. We must balance the budget and make substantial payments on our enormous debt. We must also make some reductions in taxes if possible. We may as well face the fact that these things cannot be done if all federal appropriations are continued and all federal employees are kept on their jobs.
