er gross income, totals \$2000. Sandy pointed out that these provisions apply only for income received during the war years, beginning with the calendar year 1941 and continuing until the official termination of the war.

Income received from outside the service amounting to \$500 or more, he said, must be reported. Incomes amounting to less than \$500 on which there was withholding also should be reported, Sandy advised, in order to receive the refund. Veterans were advised to consult the internal revenue collector's office to learn of other provisions.
