Favorite Recipe

Mrs. Roy Annin gives her favorite recipe for the week:

Chocolate Swedish Meringue

- 5 egg whites
- ¼ cup cocoa
- ½ teaspoon cream of tartar
- ½ cup flour
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon vanilla

Beat the egg whites until foamy, add cream of tartar, sugar and cocoa. Continue beating until spoon will stand in mixture; add vanilla and fold in the flour. Bake in buttered, shallow pan in a moderate oven about 20 minutes. Put cakes together with filling, and decorate top with filling and candied fruit and nuts. Chocolate, maple, or coffee is especially good for the filling flavor.
