### Oregon GIs Have Trade Opportunity

Salem—Under the GI bill of rights, Oregon's World War 2 veterans can study for just about any profession or vocation they choose, from medicine to music; from banking to barbering.

A directory of educational institutions approved by the Oregon state department of public instruction for the veterans' administration, and distributed to veterans organizations and county service officers by Director G. E. Sandy of the department of veterans' affairs, lists more than 165 public and private institu-

tions of learning in Oregon which ex-service men may attend at government expense. The list does not include grade and high schools, which are generally approved.

Does your husband, recently discharged from the army, aspire to become another Winchell or Graham MacNamee? He can go to one of two radio announcing schools at Portland approved by the veterans' administration.

Has he terpsicorean aspirations? Four dancing schools to each the art of dancing are on the list. If music is his yen, then send him to his choice of five approved studios, at least one of which teaches singing.

Oregon should have more aviators and airplane mechanics because a total of 44 mechanics scattered throughout the state are approved to teach subjects.

For the one-time War seeking professional help there are 13 hospitals in nursing, and eight beauty plus 28 business college banking institutes for education.
