

Contract Been Signed Bonneville

Western Oregon Benefits By Signing This Contract

LAND — A three-year contract which will give partial to the Mountain States in its present acute supply situation in the Willamette valley, and at the same time, bring lower cost to other communities in western Oregon, was executed last week by the company Bonneville Power Administration.

Terms of the contract, under administration will meet the requirements of the in excess of the generating capacity on the Mountain States Willamette valley system served from West Bonneville Power Administration J. Raver said.

The power and energy to the company at West would be in exchange for and energy which the would supply for Bonneville to Central Lincolnton Utility district at the city of Bandon Coos-Curry Electric Co.

The contract, Administrator Raver said, will be of considerable financial advantage to the agencies by providing a supply of power at a cost less than is now available.

He estimated savings to the public agencies of \$80,000.

The contract makes it possible for the Central Lincoln PUD to supply a substantial additional amount of power above present capacity to the town of Reedsport and its environs. This will materially relieve the immediate supply problem at the southern end of the PUD system. However, Administrator Raver added that this result could not be achieved until such time as the PUD, which serves Reedsport, and the company, which will feed power into the PUD system under the transfer arrangement with Bonneville, strengthen all transmission and distribution facilities in that area.

"If this work is diligently pursued," he said, "additional power can be made available in the Reedsport area in time for the peak loads in the winter of this year."

Initial deliveries by Bonneville to the company will approximate 7,000 kilowatts above the approximate 3,000 kilowatts required for transfer to the public agencies.

The administrator said that the arrangement with Mountain States, while materially helping the company's present situation, would not fully remedy the power supply problem in the Willamette and coastal areas. Complete solution of the problem, he said, and the contract so states, must await the construction by the federal government of additional high-voltage transmission facilities into the area. At the present time there are no 230,000-volt main transmission grid extensions in the Willamette valley, although these are contemplated as far

south as Roseburg. With completion of such facilities the Willamette valley will be in a position to have an adequate power supply as soon as additional generators come in on the Columbia river.

Favorite Recipe

Mrs. Rita Tierce submits her favorite recipe this week:

FRIED APPLE PIE (gourmet)
2 cups flour.
½ cup shortening
½ teaspoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon vinegar
½ teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons cold water
½ teaspoon soda
Fat for deep frying

Cut shortening into dry ingredients until of even, small lumpy texture. Add vinegar and enough cold water until pastry is light, not sticky. Chill in refrigerator an hour or more. Roll out thin chilled pastry and cut into 2½ inch squares. Put one full tablespoon of apple filling in center of each square. Press moistened edges together firmly to form triangle. Chill pies before frying. Heat fat until 315 degrees and fry chilled pies until golden brown (about three minutes). Serve pies hot with cottage cheese or whipped cream.

FILLING
1¾ cup applesauce
½ teaspoon cinnamon
½ teaspoon nutmeg.
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Mix together and chill before using as filling in pies.
