From China the ship went to New Zea- land where they picked up 400 head of cattle and 1100 sheep which were taken to Shanghai. From there, the ship docked at Vancouver, B. C., April 1. Kitchen Hints

PETER PAN COOKIES

- 1 cup spry.
- 1/2 teaspoon salt.
- 1 cup peanut butter
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar packed.
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1 teaspoon soda

Combine spry, salt, and peanut butter and mix well, add granu- lated sugar and brown sugar gradually and cream thoroughly. Add beaten eggs and milk, mix- ing well. Sift flour with soda and add first mixture, blending well.

Drop from teaspoon on baking sheet, greased with spry. Press cookies lightly with fork to flat- ten, and to make attractive tops. Bake in slow oven (325) 15 to 20 minutes. Makes 5 dozen.

ARABIAN SPICE CAKE

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup each cloves and allspice
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 Cup brown sugar, firm pack
- 1 egg unbeaten.
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 cup thick, sour milk.

Blend shortening, salt, spices, and vanilla. Add sugar gradually and cream well, add egg and beat well. Sift soda and baking pow- der with flour three times. Add floflur to creamed mixture, alter- nately with milk. Mix after each addition until smooth. Bake in 10x10x2 greased pan in moder- ate over (350) 50 minutes.

QUICK FUDGE FROSTING

- 1 cup brown sugar, firm pack.
- 3 tablespoons cocoa
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 tablespoons spry
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Combine brown sugar, cocoa, Easter holidays with relatives at spry, butter, salt and milk in Portland.

saucepan and bring to boil, stir- ring constantly, boil slowly three minutes. Cool. Add confectioner's sugar and vanilla and beat until thick enough to spread. To sub- stitute chocolate for cocoa, use 1 ounce chocolate cut in pieces and reduce spry to 2 tablespoons.

BANANA BREAD

- 1/2 cup butter.
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 3 crushed ripe bananas
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 tablespoon sour cream
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder

Cream butter and sugar; add beaten eggs, then crushed ba- nanas. Dissolve soda in sour cream and add to mixture. Sift baking powder with flour and add—bake in loaf pan in slow oven for one hour.
