Dollinger, as he addressed a packed house at the Chetco Inn, Sunday evening when he lectured on "The Truth About Hell."

"Hell is no joke," he said, "nor is it a myth; nor is it an inven-

tion of the clergy who would like to scare people into the church." He referred to Matthew 5 and Revelation 20 to show that hell is a real place into which the wicked will be cast bodily alive. He showed from Isa 34 that this earth would be the place of punishment; that the land would become burning pitch and the dust brimstone, and that the wicked would be devoured in these flames.

On Monday night there was keen interest shown as the evangelist solved "The Great Mystery of Death" by explaining just what leaves man when he dies.

The topic on Tuesday night "How to Postpone Your Funeral" was one that many people were eager to hear. The diet and habits of individuals often bring them into premature death. They dig their graves with their teeth the evangelist said, and then he pointed out that the God who made man also told him what to eat and how to live.
