The new Rotary club of Brookings has the same general objectives as all other Rotary clubs in North and South America, in Europe and Asia, in Africa and the islands of the Pacific—to encourage and foster the Ideal of Service as a basis of worthy enterprise, and in particular, to encourage and foster:

1. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

2. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying by each Rotarian of his occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

3. The application of the Ideal of Service, by every Rotarian to his personal, business and community life;

4. The advancement of international understanding, good will, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional men united in the ideal of service.

The Rotary club of Brookings tentatively will hold weekly meetings at Vincent's Fountain at noon Wednesdays. This may be changed to prevent any conflicts found by members. As soon as it has been formally admitted to membership in Rotary International, its official Rotary charter will be delivered by Earl Stuart, district governor at a special meeting which will be attended by Rotarians from many of the clubs in this Rotary district.

If chartered, Brookings will be distinctive in that it will be the most westerly club in the United States, which distinction, before his, was held by Coos Bay.

Temporary officers whose tenure expires at the charter meeting, are Dewey Akers, chairman, and K. H. Hibbard, secretary. Classification committee includes Ed F. Ackley, T. S. Abbott and Ralph Vincent.

AAA Signup Due Before May 1st

GOLD BEACH—May 1 will be the last day that Curry county farmers and ranchers can sign up to co-operate in the 1947 agricultural conservation program, C. J. Doyle, chairman of the county AAA committee, has announced.

While about 136 operators already have filed their plans at the county office, Doyle pointed out that there are a few who may be disappointed later because they didn't file in time.

Program practices must be approved by the committee before they are carried out, which is an important reason the county committee would like to complete all sign-ups as early as possible. Program funds will not be available to assist farmers and ranchers with the cost of the practices if prior approval is not given by the county committee.

The chairman explained that practices which qualify for payment must contribute to conservation on the farm and fit into the over-all conservation program of the county. Each county receives an allotment for conservation work, the amount of work for which payment can be made is limited by the size of the county budget. The system of operators declaring their intentions to carry out practices under the program on plan sheets each year makes possible a fair allocation of the funds available for conservation. \$40,000 has been allotted to Curry county.

R. M. Conley, Brookings, led the Curry county hunters last month, taking nine predators in 27 days of work, says R. M. Knox, county agent, Gold Beach. The predators taken included two coyotes and seven bobcats.

Dick Adams took two coyotes and one bob cat in 10 days. He also spent nine days assisting farmers in setting traps for bobcats. Stanley Colegrove worked 27 days, taking one coyote, three bobcats and two bears. Robert Hildebrand worked 18 days, taking three bobcats.

All of the part-time hunters have been laid off until after July 1, when the new budget will be made up. Funds have been exhausted, according to Gene Albert, supervisor of this district. Z. J. Crockett just reported taking two coyotes with 'getters' although he is not on the payroll.

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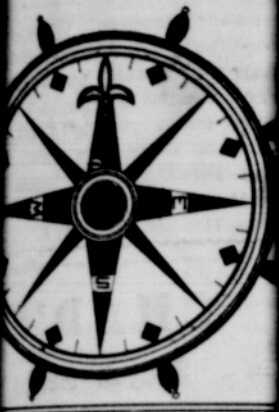
