

Curry County-wide Electrification Is To R. E. A.

Gold Beach Company and Confab With Coos-Curry Co-op

GOLD BEACH — At a joint meeting of the boards of directors of the Coos-Curry Electric Co-operative and the Rogue River Co-operative, held here Friday evening, it was voted to apply for a loan from R. E. A. in an amount sufficient to purchase the option of the Henry to the Rogue River Co-operative.

Action was announced last night by Dr. W. A. Cartwright, mayor of Gold Beach, and

president of the Rogue River Power Co-operative. The option includes the sale of the present power system, now operating in central Curry county. Approximately 25 miles of distribution line is required to join each of the two separate co-operative systems now serving Port Orford on the North and Brookings on the south.

This meeting was held as a result of a resolution passed April 5, by unanimous vote of the membership which established policy for the basis of negotiation with the Coos Co-operative and REA. This resolution was prepared by a committee representing all sections of central Curry and headed by Paul Connett, president of the Gold Beach chamber of commerce other members of the committee included O. P. Ferguson of Squaw Valley Herman Koblenzar, of Ophir, James Walker of

Pistol River and P. O. Bowman of Jerry Flat.

This committee recommended that the board of directors should be instructed to negotiate for consolidation on the following basis:

1. That equitable representation on the board of directors be provided, with consideration as to the area served, number of users or members and gross revenue or volume of power used.

2. That uniform rates are made applicable immediately upon transfer of the operations.

3. That construction of a distribution line between Port Orford and Brookings should be started immediately upon the completion of the transaction, and completed as soon as materials are available.

4. That a transmission line be constructed as soon as materials and power become available to take care of power needs of the heavy industry.

The Coos board of directors accepted this plan as being in full agreement with their thinking, but advised that the loan division and the rate division of REA would determine the basis for approval of the loan.

Cancer Fight Is Waged By Nation

Cancer the disease that kills someone in the United States every three minutes, is holding the spotlight this month in the national cancer drive to raise funds to combat the dread disease.

Under leadership of the local American Legion Auxiliary, this drive will be carried to the homes of the area. Of funds collected 40% will go into the research program of the American Cancer society. The remainder stays in the locality to be used for grants to the University of Oregon Medical school where the fight against cancer is being carried on.

Some of the funds will be used in education of the public in order to recognize symptoms of the disease.

A few simple rules are given to aid people in the recognition of cancer:

1. Any sore that does not heal—particularly about the tongue, mouth or lips.
2. A painless lump or thickening especially in the breast, lip or tongue.
3. Bloody discharge from the nipple, or irregular bleeding from any of the natural body openings.
4. Progressive change in the color or size of a wart or mole.
5. persistent indigestion.
