"house-maid knee" at

this busy cleaning season, instead of using a mat to kneel on when washing or polishing floors, and having to haul it around with you, just fasten rubber sponges to the knees with elastic garters.

To prevent the gloss from coming off white paint, wash with milk and a very little soap.

Rub the meat of a pecan nut into a bad scratch on highly polished furniture. Then rub, with furniture polish. You will hardly see the scratch.

I save our mahogany and walnut furniture when it gets scratched by coating the scratches liberally with iodine and, when the iodine is dry, polishing well with furniture polish.

For stubborn marks on floors use some steel wool—a wonderful time saver. This will also apply to scuff marks from boys' boots on your linoleum—before you give it your annual coat of clear varnish.

### Favorite Recipe

Mrs. B. J. Gould submits her favorite recipe this week:

HAM AND PINEAPPLE  
Slice of ham, 1 inch thick from center cut of cured ham.

2 cups milk  
2 tablespoons butter.  
1 can sliced pineapple

Soak the ham in the milk for four hours, when ready to cook remove ham from milk and place in hot pan with the butter. Cook slowly until brown and then turn ham and brown on other side. Transfer ham to another pan and place in warm oven where it will stay hot but not cook. Put slices of pineapple in pan with ham juice and brown on both sides. Place ham in platter with slices of browned pineapple on top and around it. Mix pineapple juice with ham gravy, and pour over ham.
