## Chamber Will Explain Custom Cannery Set-up

People Did Not Understand Effort Pushed By Group

Custom canning and use of a freezing plant, long advocated by the chamber of commerce for this area, and toward which little response was shown, needs explaining, it was brought out at the meeting of the chamber, last Wednesday evening, at the Odd Fellows hall, when April's meeting was held.

In making their report, Jim Yelton and Luther Tisdale, of the new crops and industries committee, asked to be relieved of their duties inasmuch as the community response had not warranted further effort. At this point it was explained that so few in the community really understood what was meant by custom canning, and an educational program was urged for the *Will Can For Individuals*.

A couple had been interested in establishing a custom cannery near the state line, to which anyone could take their fruit, vegetables, or meat for canning, to pay for this work according to the amount and style of canning. People could use this facility for home canning, or were permitted to have the produce canned for marketing.

Custom canneries do not buy the produce, and set up a marketing system.

*Committee Retained*

Since the project had not been given proper publicity, President Pete Lesmeister told the group that he would not accept resignations of the committee members, but would in turn ask that a thorough educational plan be worked out, to be publicized in the Pilot when made available.

*Large Group Present Wednesday*
