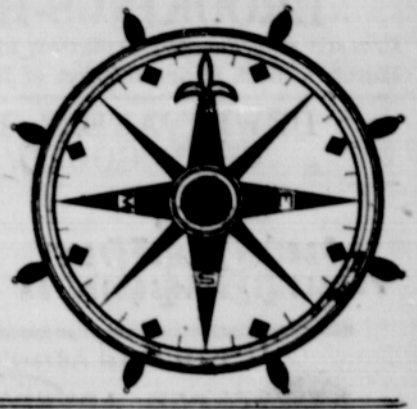

Curry county will have its own "Scouting District," according to plans laid Friday evening at Gold Beach when a number of adults connected with scouting gathered to discuss all plans.

Heretofore, scouts of Curry county were under what was designated as Coquille district. Before Curry county made scouting as popular as it is today, this plan worked well. Paced by the Brookings troop, scouting has grown so much that a county district is necessary.

At the meeting, presided over by E. A. Seaton, R. G. Sabin, sheriff, was named chairman, R. S. Perkins, vice-chairman, and Ray Gardner, district commissioner. Area chairmen include Dewey Akers, Brookings, Ray Gardner at Gold Beach and Mr. Thomas as Port Orford.

For lack of a scoutmaster, the Langlois area has never started a troop, although a poll of the schools showed 100% of the boys interested in scouting.

Second Meeting Planned in June
To complete plans, a second district meeting is planned early in June, when scoutmasters, all committeemen and others interested in scouting will gather to decide upon the extension of the scout program in the county; a camporee, camping areas, district court of honor, fall show, charter review "Westward Ho", and such other business necessary to carry on the scouting program.
