

Saturday Set As Annual Poppy Day

May 24 will be Poppy day in Brookings and throughout the United States, Mrs. Haggerty, president of Chetco Unit, No. 138 Legion Auxiliary, announced today.

Volunteers from the Auxiliary and others of the city will distribute the flowers on the streets throughout the day. Mrs. Mendenhall, poppy chairman, will be in general charge.

"Saturday before Memorial day has been observed as poppy day in all parts of the country for many years," Mrs. Haggerty said in announcing the date. "Poppies have been worn in memory of the war dead ever since close of World War I. These are replicas of the wild flowers which grew on the battlefields of France and Belgium.

"Poppies which the Auxiliary will distribute are all hand-made—of crepe paper—by disabled veterans in hospitals and convalescent homes over the nation.

Conley Reports On Predatory Killings

Seventy-three predatory bear have been destroyed since a year ago in that portion of Curry county lying between Pistol River and the California line, according to R. M. Conley, government hunter.

Conley does not claim all these as several were taken by his partner, Zahnie Crockett, of Pistol River, though Conley did get most of them.

Mr. Conley, recently, on one of his rare trips for supplies, states that he doesn't know how many bear he got in February but, in that month alone, during lambing season, he got seven bobbe and Crockett are loud in their praise of a new device for use cat and a pair of coyotes. Both against coyote, yet both of them are leery of it to handle.

This new device consists of a small cyanide-charged cartridge set into the ground with trigger so arranged and baited that when something trips the weapon, a stream of cyanide is shot into the animal's mouth, causing instant death. This, the hunters claim, is ideal for a cattle range when use of traps would endanger the stock.
