5. No entries will be registered if not in hall by 10:00 a. m.
6. Blue ribbon will be awarded in each class.

3. No entry will be registered if not in the hall by 10:00 a. m.
4. Each exhibitor will furnish own container with owner's name, using adhesive tape on bottom of container.
5. Exhibitor to place only one entry in each division.
6. No ribbon will be awarded in any class having less than two entries, unless exhibit is exceptionally noteworthy.
7. Flower show committee will not be held responsible for loss or damage to any container or other property.
