Food-handlers' Schools Billed For Curry County

Resturant Grading To Begin Shortly After First Of July, 1947

SALEM—Grading of restaurants all over the state will begin as soon after July 1, as grading inspections can be made. This program will be in accordance with the Sanitary Code for Eating and Drinking Establishments, Chapter 432, Oregon Laws, 1945 and the standards and policies as set forth by the Oregon State Board of Health during the past two years. It is deemed by this office that sufficient time has been allowed for compliance since the new sanitary code was adopted by the 1945 legislature.

The three grade levels:

1. The 'A' Grade classification requires compliance with all of the items of sanitation listed on inspection sheet and in the sanitary code for eating and drinking establishments.

2. The 'B' Grade classification will be permitted on violation of Grade 'C' items if a violation is beyond the control of the operator and if bona fide proof can be shown that the material, labor or equipment is not immediately available. Grade 'B' classification will not be awarded to any food establishment where gross insanitation is noted; especially relative to toilet and laboratory facilities, cleaning or equipment, cleaning and bactericidal treatment of utensils, disposal of wastes, refrigeration and storage and handling of utensils and foods.

3. The Grade 'C' classification will allow not to exceed 30 days temporary period of operation for the correction of defects. If the defects are not corrected within this prescribed time, a hearing will be called before the health officer at which time the operator may present the reasons for lack of compliance with the respective Grade 'B' or 'A' requirements in his establishment.

A food-handlers school will be conducted in this county before grading will be made. It is the hope of the health department that all personnel will make all efforts to be present.

"Cleanliness is Good Business" is a motto emphasized by the health department, which offers itself to the disposal of any res-

taurant wishing this service.

June 24—Port Orford, at the Legion hall from 2 to 8 p. m.

June 25—Gold Beach, at the circuit court room, courthouse, 2 to 8 p. m.

June 26—Brookings, at Chetco Grange Hall, 2 to 8 p. m.
