"Rotarians from 60 countries were present, and although you might have difficulty in understanding some of them, they are men of the same opinion—service. The 1948 convention will be held at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

"There were 15,000 at the convention, and to have properly gotten all the good from this convention it would have been necessary for a club to have 30 or more present, as there was so much going on all the time."

The driver of this car disregarded a plainly marked warning sign and crossed the tracks directly into the path of a passenger train. His machine was swept up like a leaf and raked over the tracks. The driver and two occupants were killed. Signs, lights and bells are placed at crossings for the protection of motorists. Yet 2,000 were killed last year, and 70,000 injured, because they did not trouble to stop, look both ways, and listen for the warning whistle.



A driver who was not breaking any law, and two passengers with him, burned to death in this inferno when a reckless overconfident motorist tried to pass their car where the way was too narrow. The engine rammed into the gasoline tank, setting it afire, and the car was knocked off the road, end over end into a field, where it was turned into a molten furnace. The lawbreaker himself was not injured—such is the irony of highway accidents. National Conservation Bureau safety specialists report that improper passing ranked as a cause of motor vehicle deaths last year; most often it was combined with excessive speed which accounted for at least 10 percent of the fatalities.

Favorite Recipe

Mrs. Betty Brammer submits her favorite recipe:

WELSH RAREBIT

(with beer)

6 to 8 servings

Grate or grind 1 pound yellow cheese. Melt in double boiler 1 tablespoon butter. Stir in 1 cup beer. When the beer is warm stir in cheese. Stir constantly with a fork until the cheese is melted. Beat slightly and add: 1 whole egg. Season the rarebit with 1 teaspoon worchestershire sauce, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, a few grains of red pepper, 1/4 teaspoon mustard (optional), 1/4 teaspoon curry powder (optional). Serve the rarebit at once on crackers or hot toast.
