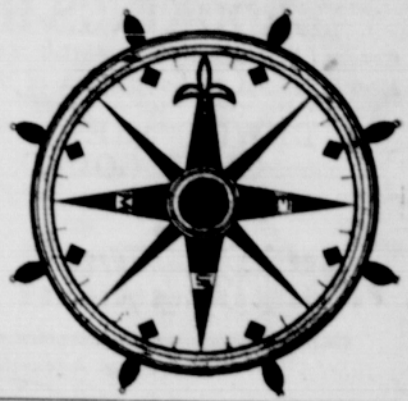

Awards were made on the basis of outstanding accomplishment. Approximately 18,000 boys and girls from all 36 counties of the state are in attendance.

Plans are already being formulated in the Curry County Agent's office for a larger attendance next year. At least 25 members should be enrolled next summer. It is recommended that the donors of scholarships should announce the basis of their awards a year in advance so that competition will be more keen.
