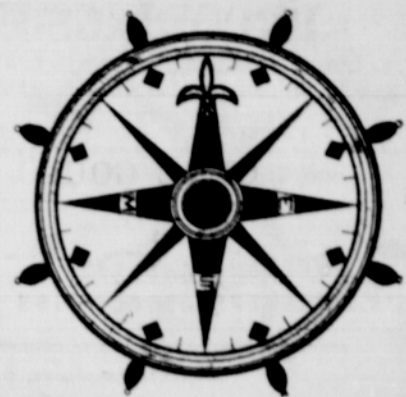

### Funeral Rites Held Today P. M. For William Darger

### Funeral Service Was At Santa Rosa, Calif., First Home in West

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:00 p. m. at the Community Baptist church, for William Darger, father of John Darger, who died Thursday at the hospital from cancer. Interment was at Santa Rosa, California, where the Dargers first lived after they came west. The service was accompanied by Mr. Ernest John Darger.

Mr. Darger was born in Iowa Jan. 17, 1879. He spent much of his early life in Minnesota. He was married to Mabel Alice Averill, who died last October 23, at Cave Junction where the couple operated a service station.

The union were born three children, Ernest, John and Averill. Mr. Darger passed away some years ago. Following the death of Mrs. Darger, Mr. Darger closed his business affairs at Cave Junction and moved to Brookings where he made his home with his son and daughter-in-law. For some time he had poor health, and during the winter spent a time in a hospital. He was taken to the Crescent City hospital, where he passed away some weeks ago, where ravages of cancer finally overcame him. Mr. Darger had been a member of the local lodge since the early part of his life.

Following the death of his wife, Mrs. Darger, her body was cremated. Her ashes were placed in a casket and buried in the grave beside him at Santa Rosa.

The undersigned directors of School District 17, as of June 4, 1947, wishes to clarify its position at that time regarding the third room of the new school building now under construction.

It was with regret the Board was unable to be in full accord with the wishes of the building committee. At the close of the present school year there was an enrollment of 322 pupils according to the principal's attendance records.

Two years ago the school board of District 17 was severely criticized for not taking adequate steps providing facilities for additional students.

At this time there is no indication that the crowded condition will be alleviated by fall. The popular opinion that many people are leaving the community and, if so, is more than offset by new people coming to this district. This is evidenced by the fact that we have been unable so far to find quarters for the new principal.

The school board would have been pleased to have called for bids on the third room construction, if time would have permitted, however, the necessity for adequate class rooms on Sept. 1, was considered more important by the board.

In any future construction the board will call for contract bids which is in accord with our letter of June 4, to the building committee.

### Due To Traffic Problem Only Dedication Ceremony Will Be Held At Croft Memorial Site; Dinner and Program Set For Azalea State Park

"Lily Blossom Time In Brookings" took on appearances of being "an event which will long be remembered," according to Fred W. Moore, one of the committee in charge of floats for the occasion. On Tuesday, his notebook showed about 40 floats entered by commercial groups, organizations and individuals for the event. 19 people, with horses, have signed up, and many, many children with bicycles will compete for prizes.

Judging will take place at 10 a. m., at the old "mess hall," before start of the parade at 10:30. For the bicycles cash prizes of \$5, \$3 and \$2 will be given, while in the floats first and second prizes will be given individual floats, and the organizations and business houses will compete in the other group for two prizes. Horses will be awarded two prizes.

Following judging, the parade will form at the highway, nearest the old mess hall, and will proceed toward Harbor and the site of the Sydney Croft memorial, where dedication ceremonies will be held. Because of possible traffic difficulties, the remainder of the program will be held at the Azalea Park, followed by a basket dinner.

Starting at 2 p. m., under direction of George Widney, local Cub Master, games for kiddies with plenty of prizes, will be held at the park.

Since horses will be entered in the parade, and a number of them are nervous, the committee asks that no fireworks be set off.
