## County Fair Board Makes 1947 Plans

GOLD BEACH—A meeting was called here last week, at the fairgrounds, where construction is going forward at a rapid rate. Two bulldozers and a crew of men were making a good showing at the site. H. H. Hansen, Nat Perkins, Judge A. H. Boice, Otis Bowman and R. M. Knox were present. Knox was appointed secretary to act in the absence of Mrs. Fromm. The fair board approved all of the changes made, and recommended the moving of the "cook house" to clear the center of the grounds.

Bowman submitted the report of the rodeo committee, including blueprints and bill of material. Boice reported for the construction committee, including blueprints and bill of material for bleachers and horse barns. Both reports were approved, and both committees were instructed to continue.

George Mateer was added to the construction committee and the secretary was ordered to notify him. Judge Boice was designated as purchasing agent for all materials to be used in the construction on the grounds.

The meeting was adjourned to the county agent's office. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Motion by Perkins,

seconded by Knox, to establish a \$50 budget to be made available to Bowman to defray expenses in connection with promoting the rodeo and horse show. It carried unanimously.

The rodeo committee includes Bowman as chairman, Mrs. V. V. Young, secretary, David Crockett of Harbor and Herb Morrill of Langlois, were requested to submit a written report and recommendations including a proposed program and premiums for the rodeo and horse show for final approval at the next meeting.

A proposed premium list, program and revised set of rules for the lamb and wool show was presented by Knox. It was approved as presented. A copy of this report is attached to these minutes. The secretary was instructed to have 500 copies printed.

W. D. Sibley, R. M. Knox and Georgia Fromm were appointed on the publicity committee for both the lamb show and fair. Sibley was authorized to solicit advertising for the fair premium list book as a source of revenue to finance the publicity.

Hugh C. Gearin, district attorney, was nominated and elected advisory member of the fair board. He was authorized to investigate the legal phase of conducting a rodeo.

Mrs. Fromm was designated as contact agent representing the fair board, to correlate the participation of the local chamber of commerce, woman's club, with the livestock association and the fair board in connection with free lamb show luncheon.

The recommendation of the livestock association were approved. The date of the show was set for July 12. Harvey Crook, Steve Spoerl, and R. M. Knox were named to the committee to supply the roast lamb.

J. H. Turner, O. P. Ferguson, and Leslie Zumwalt were named on the grounds committee, to see that the display pens and tables are in place for the show, and

The secretary was authorized to cash all war bonds in order to finance the improvement program now under way on the fair grounds.
