A list of the registered floats was not available at the moment this article was written, and a great deal of it must be done from memory. Prize winners, as turned in by Mr. Sandbo, were:

Humorous — Glenn and Vern Garvin, who dressed as prospectors, with their pack burro. Second prize went to Bill Wridge for his interpretation of a retired lily grower.

For businesses and organizations of the area: Brookings Water Co. took first, closely followed by the Community Baptist float. In this division the competition was exceptionally keen, and the task in choosing first and second prizes was most difficult. The float entered by Henry Kerr was a masterpiece of ingenuity; The Brookings Market had an exceptional float. The Rotary Club was artistically represented, not to slight any of the others such as the Grange and Rod and Gun Club.

For individuals, Bob Stanhurst, Betty Elston and Mildred Drake pooled talents to enter a float for Easy street which took first prize. Stafford Gardens was second with many other individuals closely pressing them for honors.

The horses entered in the parade drew much comment. Roy Burrell, won second place and Beverly Hill won first place. This should not detract from the task that all were so close in competition, and the margin of victory was less than a thread.

The kiddies, with their bicycles and wagons showed lots of talent for the coming generation. It was a toss-up between Carol Ann Benson and Karen Foltz with Carol winning the toss for first. Virginia Akers, with her little brother as a passenger, took third with her wagon, when she depicted "the infant" newspaper.

### Proclamation

PROCLAMATION: WHEREAS the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in the judgment of the State Forester, a menace to life and property due to conditions tending to cause or allow the rapid spread of fires which might occur or because of the inaccessible character of such areas due to the lack of suitable roads, and WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following areas designated as:

AREA NO R-1—All National Forests in Oregon and adjacent areas protected by the United States Forest Service as follows: Adjacent to Siskiyou National Forest: Secs. 29 and 32, T. 31 S., R. 11 W.; Sec. 30, T. 32 S., R. 8 W.; T. 32 S., R. 9 W.; T. 33 S., R. 8 W.; T. 34 S., Rs. 8, 11 and 13 W.; T. 35 S., Rs. 8, 11 and 12 W.; T. 39 S., Rs. 9 and 12 W.; Sec. 31, T. 40 S., R. 8 W.; T. 40 S., R. 9 W.; T. 41 S., Rs. 8, 9 and 11 W.; Sec. 33, T. 41 S., R. 12 W. NOW, THERE-

FORE, I Earl Snell, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 107-210, Oregon Compiled Laws Annotated, as amended by Chapter 252, Oregon Laws, 1945, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above-described areas to be unlawful and do hereby close said areas and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or conditions:

1. to refrain from smoking while traveling in such areas. 2. to secure a permit issued by the forester or a fire warden before building a campfire other than at improved, designated and posted campground on such areas. 3. to have as a part of his or her equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian, and/or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires. This proclamation shall be effective from and after the first day of July, 1947, and shall remain in full force and effect until and including the 31 day of December 1947. Done at the Capitol in Salem, Oregon, this 26th day of June 1947. EARL SNELL, Governor; attest, Robert S. Farrell, Jr., secretary of state.

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
