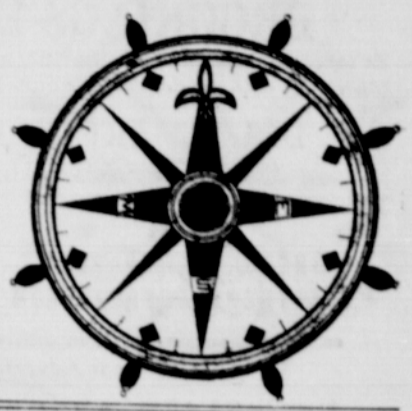

Board Adopts Revised Budget Meeting, Thurs.

Narrow Margin 107 to 89 Budget Approved for Schools

The school budget, revised after defeat on June 16, to meet the anticipated demands of No. 17, was adopted last evening by voters of the district, 106 to 89, while very close to the margin of 107 to 89 was different than the 106 to 89 defeat on June 16.

The "budget" was defeated the past two or three years after it had been pointed out that school costs would rise. The budget was defeated, when the warrants would be put on the property taxes. These warrants would draw interest.

Additional Training Added
Additional training will be added to the curriculum this year. Tools for this new year were ordered and are en route to Brookings, made possible by the Brookings Rotary which paid for the tools.

Principal Expected Here Soon
Mrs. Hampton, who has been principal for the community school and who is now attending summer school at Oregon State College, is expected to be in Brookings about August 1, the board announced. He will immediately lay out all school plans for the coming year.

Local Telephone Service Is Upped

Effective Monday, Harry Chapman, district manager of West Coast Telephone Co., has announced a new schedule for telephone service in the Brookings exchange.

The local exchange will be open from 8 o'clock a. m. to 11 o'clock p. m., on week days and from 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. on Sundays. This is in line with the expressed intention of the telephone company to establish, as soon as the new equipment may be obtained, a modern telephone exchange with unlimited service for the local subscribers.

The newly established service has been brought about chiefly through the efforts of Ed F. Ackley, local attorney. Mr. Chapman said, "Mr. Ackley has convinced the telephone company and myself that telephone service in this area should be improved. Pending the establishment of the proposed modern equipment we are pleased to make this improvement. We agree with Mr. Ackley in his assertion that Brookings should have unlimited service and shall provide such service the instant that we acquire the necessary equipment."

Radio Artists Offer Advertising Plan

Mrs. Jim Breedlove, of Roseburg, whose troupe played locally during the Azalea Festival, was in this area over the week-end visiting her sister, Mrs. Frank Waldien, who gave her the idea that radio advertising for the lily industry might be the salvation of many growers in this and other areas.

Sunday, Mrs. Breedlove contacted a few of the Croft Lily Growers Association members, to ascertain if the plan might be acceptable to them. When consent was given, Mrs. Breedlove left with the idea of devising a suitable program, which will be presented to the next meeting of the lily growers, Monday, August 11. At this time, plans will be made to outline some sort of a plan, if rates over Mutual are not too prohibitive, to give the lilies the nation-wide publicity so needed to stabilize the market.
