They say a black cat is unlucky but when a black cat runs in front of a car, and makes it, it's lucky.

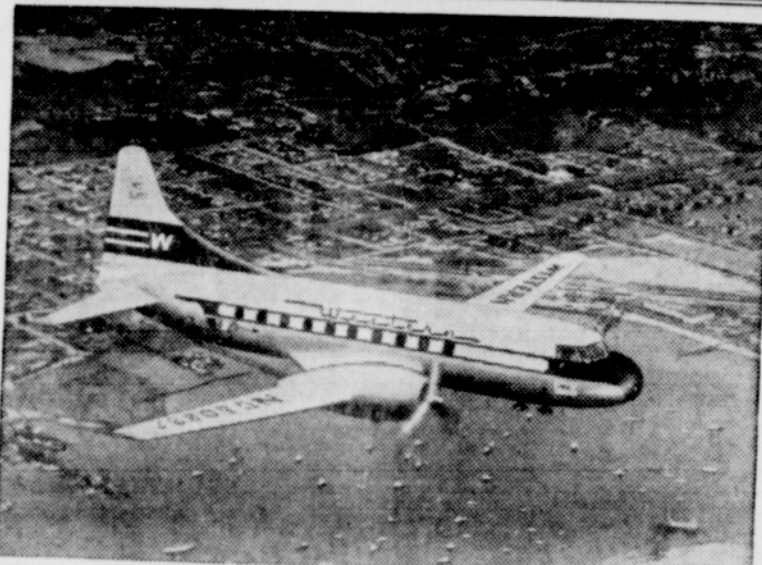
Of course there is one class that's not only out of style but also out of luck now days and that's royalty.

Western will place this 40-passenger, 300-mile-an-hour transport in service on its Pacific Coast routes this fall. The Convair is completely air conditioned and features a pressurized cabin for passenger comfort at high altitudes. Other of its features include auxiliary jet exhaust thrust, reversible-pitch propellers and heated wing de-icing. Western has 10 of these new aircraft on order. Western will inaugurate service to Portland and Seattle August 1 on a new extension of its Pacific Coast route.
