Favorite Recipe

Mrs. C. V. Johnson submits her favorite recipe this week:

- Strawberry Ice Cream Cake**
 1 cup sifted cake flour
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 cup shortening
 1/2 cup sugar
 1 egg
 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 cup milk
 1 pint vanilla ice cream
 1 pint strawberries sliced and sweetened to taste

Sift flour, add baking powder and salt and sift together. Cream shortening thoroughly, add sugar gradually, creaming until light. Add egg and vanilla, mixing until light and fluffy. Add flour alternately with milk, beating until smooth. Pour into a greased 8-inch layer pan and bake in moderate oven 350, 25 to 30 minutes or until cake shrinks from sides of pan and is springy to touch. Allow to cool in pan 2 or 3 minutes, then remove to cake rack. When cool, split in two horizontally, pile half the ice cream on the bottom and cover with half of the strawberries. Place remaining layer on top and repeat the ice cream and strawberries. Serve immediately. Serves 8.

Not one tree in fifty is suitable for novelties and years of seasoning is required to cure the wood and bring out the beauty the artisan desires. Thus sometimes years may elapse in the preparation of the gift as it comes to you.

The Myrtlewood Trees are slowly disappearing (they are next to impossible to transplant) and the time will surely come when the piece of Myrtlewood you buy today will be prized as a beautiful heirloom.
