Forest Serv. News

All regular fire stations on the Chetco district have now been manned for the 1947 fire season. Following are the stations and the men on duty:

Snow Camp Lookout—Bill Lane. Mt. Emily Lookout—Chalmers Lindsley; Vulcan Peak Lookout—Richard Newcom; Long Ridge Lookout—Herbert Reising; McGribble Guard Station—Mark Porter; Westmore Guard Station—James Luck.

The fire suppression crew of five members consists of Philip Sanford, Keith Sahlholm, Sanford Newbauer, Everett Howell, and foreman, Robert Larson. This crew has completed maintenance of the Gold Beach ranger station grounds and is now building a corral at the packer's head-

quarters at Long Ridge. The crew is also being trained in firefighting by Cecil Owen, district guard. Later in the season the suppression crew will probably re-locate the telephone line running cross country from Gold Beach to the Pistol River road to its proposed location along the new Hunter Creek road.

Sam Wood of Agness is the new packed, stationed at Long Ridge.

Fred Gardner, road foreman, and crew are continuing the construction of the Hunter Creek road. Fred expects to connect up with the Pistol River road sometime in July. This will mean a saving of many miles for anyone traveling from Gold Beach to the Snow Camp or Wildhorse areas. The present construction will be suitable for summer travel only. Later the road will be widened.

Following completion of the Hunter Creek road, Fred Gardner will begin construction of a new low water bridge across the Chetco river at the upper crossing.

Two proposed timber sales are now being advertised. Both are in the Sixes river drainage. Total volume advertised is about eight million board feet.

Leon Dubay of Gold Beach was successful bidder on the exterior painting of the Gold Beach ranger station buildings. Painting will be completed during the summer months. Mr. Dubay has done considerable interior painting and re-finishing of floors in the ranger station and dwellings.

Jimmy Luck and Chalmers Lindsley have completed maintenance work on the Westmore camp grounds on the Winchuck river. A fine picnic grounds consisting of five tables and two fireplaces is now ready for use. It is especially suitable for use by organizations or large groups. Wallace Bros. of Gold Beach Riding Academy donated two tables for the picnic grounds.

Stuart McLean, Earl Bronson, Jack Wheeler, Jimmy Johnson and foreman, Edward Ganong, are continuing the construction of the Chetco divide trail. They are now camped on the south side of Vulcan peak. This composite is 15 miles by Trailmobile from Long Ridge lookout. This trip around rocky points, along cliffs and steep hillsides, and over a narrow roadbed liberally strewn with rocks is a once-in-a-lifetime experience—once is usually all a fella wants.

The 3-man spring maintenance crew, which patrolled 110 miles of telephone line and 270 miles of trail, and approximately 80 miles of trail are still to be maintained. Additional trail maintenance will be done by the lookouts and the suppression crew if weather permits.

As soon as the tower material arrives, construction will begin on the new Mt. Emily lookout tower and lookout.

This fire season finds Bill Lane back on Snow Camp for his 22nd year as lookout on that station.

Mark Porter, Bill Lane and Dick Newcom spent an involuntary week-end in the hills this spring when high water stranded them between Boulder Creek and Box Canyon Creek.

High water kept Sam Wood busy for a few exciting minutes last month when one of his mules lost his footing while crossing the Chetco river at the Tolman crossing. The mule received a good ducking in the river and the men had to watch some of their gear go down the river.

A cruising crew, consisting of Bentley Altizer, Wallace Pesznecker and Robert Powne completed cruising 1000 acres of timber in the Sixes river drainage.
