## Kitchen Hints

### CHICKEN PIE

If there is anything that the brawny males and youngsters alike cheer over it is a deep dish main course pie, with hot gravy bubbling through the tender crust.

A new one that has been tried out lately is thick with sweet young carrots and celery in a special gravy made of condensed chicken noodle soup. This gravy has that rich yellow chicken color. It is rich in chicken flavor, too, and tender pieces of chicken meat. Topping the pie are biscuits made with mashed sweet potatoes. It's a lovely dish—and a quick one! This is how it goes:

#### THE PIE FILLING

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 2 cans condensed chicken noodle soup
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 cup cooked celery
- 1/2 cup cooked carrots
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice

Melt the butter, then add the flour and blend thoroughly. Add the chicken noodle soup and water and cook until thickened. Then add carrots and celery, and lemon juice. Put in a casserole dish and cover with sweet potato biscuits. Serves 6 to 7.

- Biscuit covering—
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 3 tablespoons shortening
- 1 cup mashed sweet potatoes
- 3 tablespoons milk.

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt together, then cut in the shortening and add the mashed sweet potatoes. Add 3 tablespoons of milk to make a soft but not moist dough. Roll about 1/2 inch thick and cut with a biscuit cutter. Arrange over the chicken pie and bake in a hot (4-5) oven for 15 minutes or until done.
