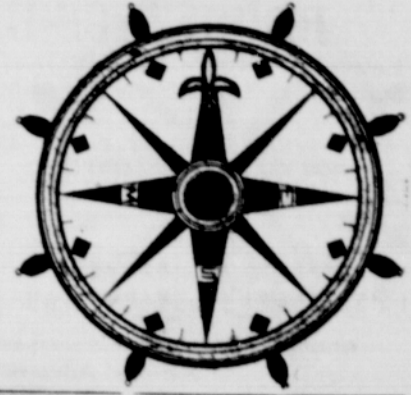

1948 Group Named Officers Monday at First Meeting

Howard James, secretary of the Croft Lily Growers Association, will be vice-president and W. S. Chadwick as named as secretary and treasurer of the next year's organization.

New Directors Named

Made up of representatives of all the organizations of this area, this association was incorporated under laws of Oregon last winter. At Monday's meeting, with a few "carry-over" directors, several new faces were seen on the 1948 board. The next meeting of the group will be held August 25, and all meetings will be held on the fourth Monday of the following months.

Will Help Lily Week Affair

Better to advertise this area as the world's biggest flower-growing area, the association decided to co-operate fully in all ways with the 1948 lily week observance. It was suggested by a number of the Azalea Festival directors to stage many events in conjunction with the Lily Week officials in an effort to raise the needed finances.

To benefit from the advertising received through the state highway commission travel bureau because of Azalea State Park, the annual barbecue will be held, as well as the flower show annually staged by the Azalea Garden club. However, there will be less emphasis placed on the Azalea Festival in future years, with festivities probably being confined to one day and an evening, unless plans are made to the contrary.

Representatives from the lily growers were emphatic in their statements concerning continuance of the festival. They wish to gain, in every way possible, all attention to this area.

This cash balance is yet in addition to the property acquired during the year, such as the queen's robe.

Rainfall Relieves Forest Fire Hazard

With 6.22 of rainfall over the past week-end all existing records of the local weather station were broken, said Paul Whirry, local chief observer, Monday, when he turned in the weekly weather report.

Last Friday, when the rain began, .08 of an inch fell over the area. Saturday, the local station recorded 3.71 inches of rain and Sunday, 2.43 inches of rain.

In checking the climatological data sheet furnished by the Portland weather bureau office, the local rainfall for 1946, was:
