Bankruptcy Heard Gold Beach, Thurs.

The petition in bankruptcy of Robert H. Cox, Jane Cox, Archie Diment and Dorothy Diment as individuals and partners in the D. & C. Radio and Appliance Co. of Brookings, was heard in the court house at Gold Beach, last Thursday. The hearing was conducted by Hon. Lester G. Oehler, of Corvallis, referee in bankruptcy, for the United States district court of Oregon.

John Crow, attorney of Portland, represented the First National Bank of Portland, and the Appliance Wholesalers of the same city; Collier H. Buffington and George L. Belt, Gold Beach attorneys, represented W. L. Crissey and Ed F. Ackley represented several local creditors.

The bankrupts were represented by Hugh Gearin of Brookings and H. Dewart, of Gold Beach.

Among the debts listed by the bankrupts were First National Bank of Portland, \$5,000.00; Appliance Wholesalers of Portland, \$1,200.00; W. L. Crissey of Brookings, \$1,700.00; and various debts, totaling about \$750.00 owed to local business men.

The bankrupts submitted to questions, relative to the bankruptcy, put to them by attorneys representing the creditors. A trustee in this matter will be appointed soon.

Local Boy Scouts Will Be Under Guidance Of Father Ison

On invitation of Father Ison, Gold Beach scoutmaster, the local Boy Scout troop will send about a dozen boys to Gold Beach August 29, 30, 31 and Sept. 1, to aid at the Curry County fair.

These boys will help with parking and directing of traffic, and will aid otherwise as needed by the fair board. In compensation, lunches will be served the boys at noon, and the morning and evening meals will be cooked by the boys themselves, who already have made many plans for the event.

In addition to these duties, the local boys expect to erect a Boy Scout camp-site, have displays of Scoutcraft for the public. Each lad will take his own sleeping bag, and will apply this experience on his camping, or cooking merit badge.

It is understood that the three troops of the county will take turns in assisting with assignments. Local boys want to uphold the tradition of scouting by competition with other troops of the county. All this activity will be under guidance of Father Ison, Gold Beach scoutmaster.
