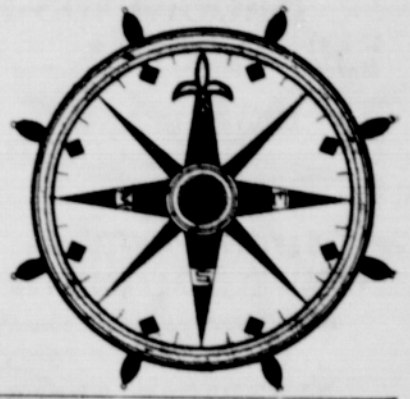

Schools Will Open Here, Sept. 15

County Fair Open Friday Gold Beach

Day's Program Starts With Parade; Show Billed Daily

BEACH—Curry County get under way tomorrow, when exhibits from the last frontier will be assembled to show the possibilities enjoyed in southwestern Oregon.

Indian Heirs Held Special Meeting Sunday Afternoon

70 People Attend Meeting; Will Check Blanks Before Next

A special meeting of Curry County Indian Heirs Association was held at the Grange hall Sunday afternoon with over 70 people present. The meeting was opened by John VanPelt, and later turned over to Sam Lopez, vice-chairman.

Help was given in filling out the identification blanks, and information was also given those who needed it.

The blanks should be filled out as soon as possible, and then sent or given to the secretary of the association, who will file them until the official roll is taken by the government.

A committee was appointed to check over the filled blanks prior to next meeting, which will be Oct. 12.

Interesting and informative talks were given by Miss N. Strayer and Wolford Wasson, both of whom are employed by the geologist who is making appraisal of the amount of minerals taken from this area, since 1855.

They reported that the geologists have been working for the past several months and will complete the appraisal soon. An appraisal of timber values of '55 has been completed and the final report is being written. These reports must be submitted to the court on Oct. 20 of this year.

One of the lawyers representing the Indian Heirs, believes that it will be about two years before the settlement is finally made, but another one of the lawyers figured it could be done next year.

Registration Dates Set Next Week For High School Students; Parents Urged To Help In New District Census

Lynn O. Hampton, New Principal, Asks Early Registration To Enable Him To Make Room Assignments To Get Best Arrangements of Rooms

Monday, September 15, was set as opening date for Brookings schools, at a board meeting held Monday evening, with information concerning buses to be decided at a later meeting for announcement.

Seniors Asked To Register September 3

Senior students are asked to register at the principal, Lynn Hampton's, office on Wednesday afternoon and evening, September 3, from 1:30 to 5, and 7 to 9 p. m.; juniors will register on Thursday afternoon and evening, September 4 with the same hours; Freshmen and Sophomore will register Friday afternoon and evening, September 5 (same hours). Seventh and eighth graders on September 5, 1:30 to 5, and 7 to 9. All registrations will take place in classrooms adjacent to the principal's office.

It would be appreciated, Mr. Hampton told the Pilot, Tuesday, if parents of six-year high school students who are now out of the community, but expect to enroll when school starts, would notify the school by post card or letter, of the number of such high school students, and their age and grade in the six-year high school plan.

In order to better schedule rooms and classes, it is requested that families with school children, who have moved into the community since school closed last May, would immediately notify the principal by post card or letter, listing the age, grade and number and names of such children. This information is urgently needed now!

Beginner Admitted According To School Law

Beginners will be admitted to school, whose 6th birthday occurred on or before November 15, as required by Oregon school law. The local school board and administration passed a regulation that because of the extremely crowded conditions, no exception will be made under any consideration.

Grade School Announcements Not Ready

Grade and room assignments cannot be announced at this time, but will be told previous to school opening. Information concerning the number of new children (newcomers to the community) is urgently needed before this information can be told.

Six-year high school students will find a number of changes in effect when school opens. The students' day will be divided into six one-hour periods. All regular students will be required to carry four regular subjects in addition to physical education, which is also required unless the student brings a statement from a physician saying that the student should not participate.

New courses definitely added to the curriculum are bookkeeping, Spanish I, woodworking and mechanical drawing. Because of very limited room facilities, woodworking will be offered to senior boys, mechanical drawing and Spanish offered to junior and sophomore levels, and bookkeeping to seniors and junior if the schedule clears.
