Demonstration Agent In County

GOLD BEACH — Mrs. Aldene Roberts of Lebanon, Kans., arrived here Monday to assume her duties as the first home demonstration agent for Curry county.

Mrs. Roberts, a home economics graduate of Kansas State College, has had previous experience in home demonstration work in New Mexico. In Curry County she will work in co-operation with R. M. Knox, county agent, on the 4-H club work and will also organize and direct a program for the women of Curry county on all phases of home-making.

Tuesday afternoon, 11 members of Curry County Home and Rural Life Committee met at the court house with Mrs. Mabel C. Mack, assistant state home demonstration leader for Oregon State College, Mrs. Roberts and R. M. Knox for purpose of planning the home makers program for the coming months. Mrs. Fred Adams of Ophir presided at the meeting.

The committee planned regular monthly meetings in three districts of the county. Homemakers from the northern end of the county will meet the third Friday of each month at Sixes, those in central Curry the third Tuesday at Gold Beach and in the south end the third Wednesday at Chetco Grange hall. All homemakers of the county are cordially invited to attend and participate in these meetings. As planned, the program:

October: Planning nutritious meals for the family.

November: Sea Food Cookery.

December: Selection and use of the new fabrics for clothing and home furnishings.

January: Sewing machine clinics at which machines will be cleaned, oiled, and adjusted.

February: House plans that meet the needs of your family.

March: Plans for remodeling homes.

April: Work simplification applied to ironing and other household tasks.

May: Work simplification applied to daily and weekly care of the house.

June: Food preservation by freezing and canning.

In addition to these monthly meetings, training will be given to homemakers who enroll for special workshops in making of dresses, dress forms and foot stools. Homemakers who assisted with this program planning included:
