to a score of 85.00 per cent or
better when compared to the
breed's score card allotting 100
points to a perfect animal.

This cow, through her des-
cendents, should do much toward
improving production among the
dairy cattle of Curry county and
Curry county is fortunate in hav-
ing, within its boundaries, such
progressive breeders, who have
two other "record cows":

Observer Treva Jill, 1529240,
has completed a record of 12145
lbs. milk and 642 lbs. butterfat,
which has qualified her for the
silver medal award of the cattle
club.

Brampton Goldie Likeness, 135-
8376, has completed a record of
14029 lbs. lbs. milk and 807 lbs.
butterfat, which has qualified her
for the gold and silver medal of
American Jersey Cattle Club.

Seven registered Jersey cows,
owned by Ralph E. Cope, Jr., of
Langlois, have made outstanding
production records as announced
by American Jersey Cattle Club.
Opal Crystal Lady 1386634 with
a lactation record of 17033 lbs.
milk and 953 lbs. butterfat is
the Oregon 365-day state class
milking champion in the senior
three-year old class. This cow
produced more than four and one-
half times as much butterfat as
the average dairy cow in the
nation. Her production record al-
so qualifies her for the medal of
merit and silver medal award
of the cattle club.

Silken Rose Lass 1312570 and
Eagle Boy Floss of I. N. 1430003
have both qualified for the sat-
tle club's medal of merit award.
Rose Lass with a production re-
cord of 13587 lbs milk and 773
lbs butterfat and Floss with a
production record of 14379 lbs.
milk and 777 lbs butterfat, both
at 5 years of age.

Eagle Boy Trixy 1430005 and
Polo St. Mawes Pansy 1412491
have each qualified for the gold
and silver medal awards of the
club. Trixy with a production of
11176 lbs. milk and 642 lbs. but-
terfat and Pansy with a record
of 11613 lbs. milk and 648 lbs of
butterfat, both a 3 years of age.

Polo St. Mawes Silken Lady
1382533 and Lady Polo Margie
1450828 have each have each
qualified for the cattle club's
silver award. Silken Lady with
a production record of 10866 lbs.
milk and 606 lbs butterfat at 4
years of age and Margie with
a production of 9826 lbs. milk and
580 lbs butterfat at 3 years, be-
ing more than 2½ times the av-
erage production of cows in the
nation.
