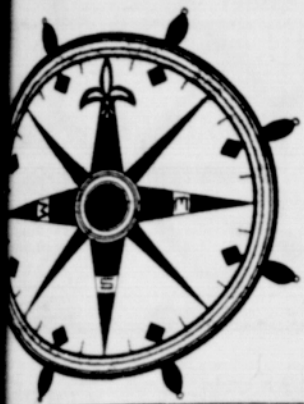
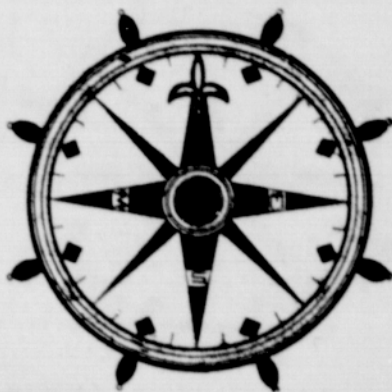

ate Hwy. Dept. Landscaping Road Approach To Town

Ports of Brookings- Harbor Chamber of Commerce Responsible

Work on landscaping, terracing and planting of shrubs on the highway approach at the north end of town was begun yesterday by the state highway crew, following efforts of the "roads" committee of chamber of commerce.

The chamber of commerce asks anyone in this area who have shrubs of any kind to donate them to be transplanted to the highway approach toward the finishing of the highway. Names of donors will be published in the next issue of the Pilot.

To expedite this work, the highway crew, rather than to move equipment from another point of view, has asked to use local equipment, if possible.

Part of the hill near the approach to town will be cut away, the remainder to be terraced, according to state standards, with flowering shrubs to be planted for attraction. Cutting of a portion of this hill will give a view of Brookings before the traveler reaches town. The landscaping will start about at the point where the beach road crosses the highway.

Part of this nature, on the south end of town awaits change of the highway at the approach to the Chetco bridge.

ool Facts Are en By Group

Proving that school costs are ridiculously low in this area, the group studied on page seven of the Pilot, furnished by the Progressive Taxpayers of Brookings-Harbor, Leo Lucas, Pres., and S. Chadwick, Sec.

Lucas told the Pilot, Tuesday evening, after returning from Brookings, that he learned at the county superintendent's office that during war years, there had been a decrease in enrollment at Port Orford and Gold Beach. Brookings had shown a big increase. Comparison of these facts is on page seven.

The pupil cost comparison is most revealing of the economy exercised by the local budget committee and school board. From the county superintendent's office, these figures appear on the budgets of the school districts mentioned in the advertisement paid for by the Progressive Taxpayers of Brookings-Harbor.

Brookings School Superintendent Points Out Error In School Comparison

C. A. Lindsley Compares Entire Brookings- Harbor Budget With Gold Beach High School

"C. A. Lindsley published his letter in both the Del Norte Triplicate and Curry County Reporter, comparing costs of Gold Beach and Brookings, he used the cost of Gold Beach Union High School against the costs of the entire school in Brookings, grade and high," Lynn Hampton, superintendent, told the Pilot, Saturday. "I mailed this letter to these papers, correcting Mr. Lindsley's erroneous supposition, and to also put him straight matters."

Editor, Del Norte Triplicate and Curry County Reporter: I should like to clarify another article which appeared in the last issue of your paper. This article was signed by C. A. Lindsley, and made reference to an article which I had formerly prepared, making a comparison between the rejected Brookings-Harbor budget with the totals of Both the Gold Beach Union High School and the Gold Beach grade school budgets as well as Langlois and Port Orford. To make a valid comparison, the above procedure is necessary since Brookings-Harbor educate both high and elementary school pupils, whereas the union high school educate only high school children.

I would suggest, therefore that Mr. Lindsley make another comparison in which he includes both Gold Beach Union High and Gold Beach Grade School, since the district he compares educates both high and elementary school pupils.

If the author of the above-mentioned article will take time to look at the new Brookings-Harbor budget, he will notice that there is a grade school column, a high school column, and a total column. Unfortunately he compared the total high school and elementary school column with the Gold Beach Union High School rather than the column headed "high school." Since I have the Brookings-Harbor budget handy, I will make the comparison, using Mr. Lindsley's figures for Gold Beach Union High School, and our New Brookings-Harbor Budget:

Lily Bulb Meeting Attracted More Than 400, Thurs.

Committee Met With Chain Store Group, Friday at Coos Bay

R. M. Knox, county agent, and J. H. Hunt, representing the Gold Beach Lily Co-operative, which has been working for sale of 5s and 6s to chain stores all over the country, were present last Thursday night at Harbor Grange hall to explain the proposed plan of that organization to move these smaller bulbs in a non-competitive market.

This deal has been hanging for some time, the two explained, and the proposal made by that organization was explained to local growers, of which over 400 were present.

With nothing definite to offer in way of amount of price the meeting ended in discussion of boxing, hauling and such, if the plan did materialize.
