Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Grayshel will leave Oct. 5, for a vacation and will attend Oregon Coast Association meeting at Gearhart.

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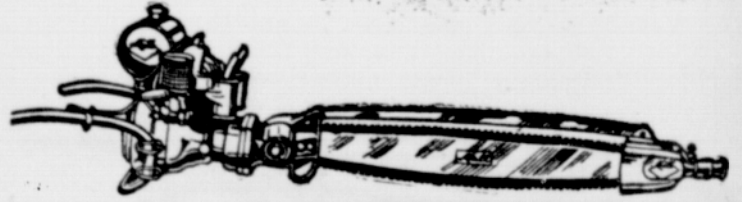
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
