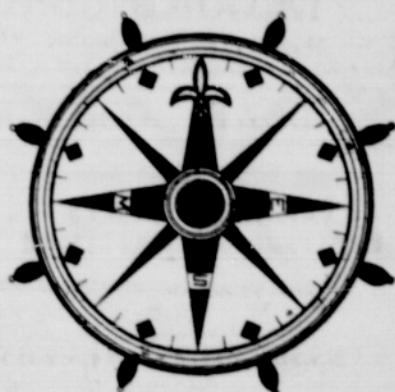

Lt. Cormier Was Speaker, Tuesday To Rotary Club

Sea Scout, Air Scout And Explorers Have Much Same Program

All senior scouting programs are more or less interchangeable. Lt. Cormier, representing Roger Bales, scout executive of Eugene, told Brookings Rotary club, on Tuesday noon, while here to organize a sea scout ship, which is being sponsored by the club as part of its community service program.

"Last summer, at Whidby Island, near Seattle, site of the sea scout encampment, there were air scouts who took advantage of the naval air force facilities. The forest service has charge of training of the explorer scouts.

"The only expense the boys were out, at Whidby Island, included transportation there and home, plus \$12 for the 10-day program. With the forest service plan, there is no charge except transportation, as the boys work part of the time under guidance of forest service men.

"I would like to point out that the army and navy feel kindly toward the senior scouting program," he continued, "by stating that the army air force, with no plan of recruiting, has assigned an officer to each of the 12 regions of the United States.

"A check of the army air force officers showed that 80 per cent of them had been scouts, and of the 80 per cent, 20 per cent had been eagle scouts in their youth. The scouting program has the hearty endorsement of both arms of the service."

Thus Lt. Cormier, who visited the school Tuesday afternoon, explained sea scouting to the Rotarians. He invited everyone interested, to sit in on the organization meeting, that evening, as all details were explained.

Sales Tax Beaten By Oregon Voters

For the third time since 1940, Oregon residents turned down a proposed sales tax, passed by Oregon legislature last spring, and at the same time, turned down a cigarette tax, according to unofficial reports here Wednesday morning.

At the time this paper goes to press, no count was obtainable, but it was said to have been defeated in most all counties.

The light vote in this area was typical of the state, turning the sales tax down, 98 to 63, and the cigarette tax, 82 to 78.

Generally over the state a light vote was cast by citizens, who seemed in doubt about voting.
