Mrs. Olive Weideman just received word that her brother, M. F. Phelps, of Springfield, Ill., is seriously ill. She left for that place, Tuesday.



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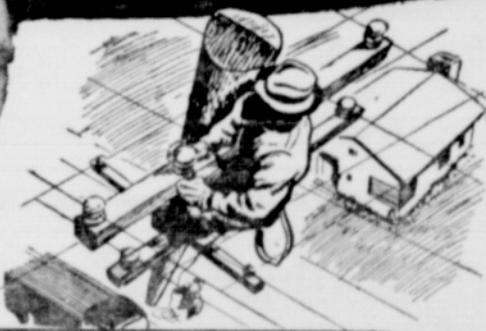
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
