WANTED AT ONCE—

Wanted: a typing teacher who can furnish her own typewriter! Such might well be the adv for the local high school typing department. There are 21 hopeful typists enrolled for Typing 1 and only eight machines. In order to permit 21 students to take typing 1, and 12 students will take typing 2, Miss Woodward and Mr. Hampton, instructors, have brought their own portables to school to loan to the students. In addition, Robert Kerr is using his own machine. With 32 freshmen enrolled this year, who will want to take typing next year as sophomores, the problem is rather acute. But with a will to learn, this year's sophomores hope to attain a reasonable degree of accuracy and speed during the year. The 12 juniors and seniors taking typing 2 hope, during the year, to perfect their speed and accuracy, and learn the "tricks" of the trade for commercial work.

Thirty-two students are taking book-keeping under Mr. Hampton's instruction. The past week they have been learning to make journal entries, and to post the ledger.

With some 32 in the Freshman class, English 1, General Science, general mathematics and geography class are filled to capacity.
