MAPS EXPLAINED TO BOY SCOUTS

"Maps are the greatest tool of mankind," M. S. Brainard told Troop 32., Boy Scouts, Monday evening, in his talk to the boys, "and real and bloody wars have been fought for possession of certain maps".

"No scout should ever be without a map or compass, for with these two anyone can find his way out of any wilderness. Maps, to most of you, mean those colored design you see in your ge-

ographies, and I hope to show you what a small part those are in use of maps."

He then showed the boys copies of forest service maps, county maps, city maps, topographical maps, and explained the use of each, which the boys appreciated.

Youth Guidance Topic At Rotary

With Rev. Nick Neufeld, pastor of Community Baptist church, as principal speaker, the local Rotary club discussed youth and youth problems, together with a plan for a community center to care for the teen-agers.

While the discussion was inclusive, the consensus was that there actually was no juvenile delinquency—rather it was delinquent parents who were glad to have their children leave the home most of the time, that the parents could pursue their own inclinations.

Girl Scouts in this area was pointed out as a great need, inasmuch as there was considerable being done for the boys by and through the comprehensive

scout program, with nothing at all being done for the girls.

Report was made on the community center, for which incorporation papers are filed. Late in the winter, or early next spring a community-wide program will be set up, it was pointed out.

Generally, it was conceded at the Rotary meeting that children "were wonderful, considering the parents they were shackled to."

He explained how he came to be awarded this honor, and how much he appreciated the honor.
