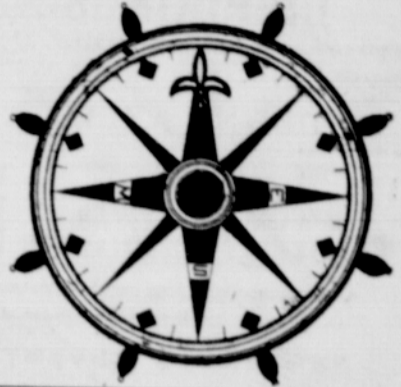

C. To Hold Hearings On Bus Franchise

Brookings Witness To Called First In Testimony Hearing

Public Utilities Commission began Tuesday with a series of open hearings, when testimony was and will be heard concerning the proposed franchise of American Bus Lines to travel Highway 101.

Hearings Postponed

Before going to press, the commission has informed that these hearings have been postponed for a period of time, or until a ruling is made down by the Interstate Commerce Commission, regarding the type of service across a large area. This was on motion by the commission.

The franchise of American Bus Lines to travel Highway 101, from Brookings, Friday, Brookings will be the first heard in deciding case, followed by testimony from a number of coast cities who have voted to favor the franchise.

Practically Unanimous

Orford city council and the board of commerce voted in favor of the franchise grant. Gold Beach, city council, board of commerce, Yachon, Waldport, Newport, and Brookings were unanimous in their actions.

According to Guernsey Frazier, chairman of the American Bus Lines in Brookings, on Tuesday there has been no objection toward the proposed franchise.

Letter Explains Chain Store Deal "Going Through"

Growers Told To Pack 6's and Up and Have Ready To Ship

Several people of this area, members of the Pacific Bulb Growers Association, received the following letter, which is self-explanatory:

"It will be of great interest to all lily growers who have surplus lily bulbs, Croft-type, from six-inch and up, that the Pacific Bulb Growers Association, known as the 'over-all association,' has definite word that the chain stores are definitely working on a plan to help us out in this emergency, of over-production.

"A great deal of work has been done by R. C. Keuhner, of the Farm Market Relations of the chain stores, to bring about this aid. A marketing committee, representing the different districts, had been formed and it is now wholly between them and the heads of the chain stores, to perfect the details of the plan for marketing. Meanwhile growers who are interested should make sure how many cases of each size they will have to dispose of this way and prepare them in dry peat moss and keep them in a well-aired, cool place.

"The chain stores deserve the gratitude of the growers for this spirit of helpfulness they have shown in helping us out in this surplus emergency. They have given this service to the public before in the matter of food products but this their first attempt to help dispose of any goods classed as non-essentials. This accounts for the time it has taken to get this campaign launched.

"The marketing committee is now active, preparing for the next step. Further directions will follow soon.
