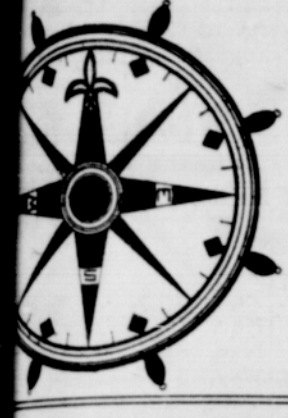
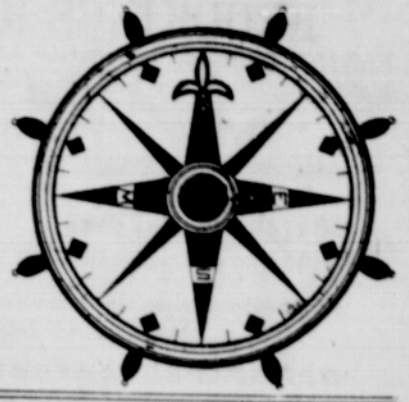

Future Of Area May Be Judged By Past Growth

W. L. Crissey and Marshall Dana Were Rotary Speakers

A narrative story concerning the history and development of the Brookings-Harbor area, was given Rotary members, Tuesday noon by W. L. Crissey, pioneer flower grower and fancier of this area, who came here "back when nine out of ten houses in the town were boarded up."

In telling of his first visit to the area, Mr. Crissey said that he and his wife came here on a vacation, driven over the old roads of that time. "It took over three hours for us to make it here from Pistol River." His second visit was in February and it was the weather at Portland at the time he returned that decided his settling here permanently.

He told of his early-day planting of flowers in the area, and how he had watched the flower industry expand in the past decade or more.

"When asked what he thought of the future of the area, Mr. Crissey said he always judged the future by the past. He then pointed out that many changes had come about in the past ten years, and especially in the last five. If the past is indicative of the future then there will be a steady growth. "The climate is in our favor—and that certainly cannot be denied."

Reviewing the old roads with present Highway 101, Mr. Crissey told of the development of the highway, and that the state spent more on the highway than valuation of the county was at the time the road construction began.

Rotary Principles Are Needed
In his remarks to the Club, Marshall Dana, editor of the editorial page of Oregon Journal, told the local club that principles of Rotary almost alone would determine whether or not the world would have peace or war in the future. "If there can be nothing but distrust, there will be war, and the golden rule will not save us from it."

"This is Armistice day—in observance of cessation of hostilities in 1918. That peace never lasted because of the peace treaty and right now we must guard against a like peace pact."

Booklets, a reproduction of his article appearing in the Oregon Journal following his return to America from a trip to the east, were distributed to members of the club.
