

Pacific Lily Meet Held At Coos Bay Last Friday P. M.

Packing Urged By Committee In Charge Of Arrangements

A meeting of the Pacific Lily Growers Association, of the entire west coast, was called last Friday afternoon at 1:30 at Coos Bay, to further work out the chain store project for helping this district market surplus lily bulbs.

Representatives from the Del Norte, Humboldt, South Curry County, were asked to set aside while it was decided the proper moves to be made to get the right representation on the marketing board. It was decided by them to have Floyd Thurman represent the McKinleyville association, Mrs. G. Jacobson, the Del Norte association, Howard T. James the Croft Association, and May Stafford the independents.

Then these four were told to vote for one of the four to serve on the marketing committee. The job fell to Mrs. Stafford.

It was voted that a committee of three be chosen from the entire territory by Mr. Bergen, acting as president of the Pacific Lily Growers, to work out the marketing plans. Mr. Bergen named Floyd Thurman of Arcata, Mr. Hunt of Gold Beach and Mrs. Stafford of the independents. It will be the function of this committee to meet this week at the Stafford home to work out all the plans.

R. C. Keuhner of the Farm Marketing relations of the Oregon Chain Store group, Mr. Hill-mer of Oregon Chain Stores and Dinty Moore of Oregon State College were present. Mr. Hill-mer told the group that they might expect 17,000 of the 25,000 chain stores in the United States to participate in the campaign in March and April, to sell the surplus of 5s-6 in January. The order will be place with the one who will be chosen head of the marketing committee. Meanwhile all there is to do is for the growers to pack all their bulbs in the driest peat moss, store them in a well-aired, cool place and wait until January, when the committee will tell them the next step.

Some will be skeptical about bulbs keeping without sprouting until that time. Experiences of many were cited that in dry peat moss there will be little or no sprouting but it is necessary that bulbs be packed at once. Any clean boxes will do, with accur-

ate count on the box. Growers are asked not to go to or write the chain store association.

A meeting of growers of Curry, Del Norte and Humboldt counties will be held at Harbor Grange hall, Monday evening, Nov. 17, at 7:30. All growers interested in helping in this matter are invited to come, regardless of what association they belong to. However, each grower who is interested in participating should pack their bulbs.

Relative to the 7-12 inch bulbs and double-nose bulbs over 8s, there is a marketing plan that will be reported by Mrs. Stafford as soon as possible.
