Perhaps I did have to raise my voice at times to be heard above the small matter—and I am glad that their mothers wanted to attend our meeting badly enough to bring them. The rest of you young mothers bring your children, too and if there is a demand, perhaps we can find a "sitter" for them.

Pacific Coast Seafoods! Is there anything better? I think not! As I told you last week, the subject for the November Home Extension Unit meetings was Sea Foods and Their Uses. There were 4 recipes demonstrated, and many other recipes discussed and given to the women to try at home. Miss Lucy Case, Nutrition Specialist from Oregon State College gave them demonstrations at Gold Beach and the women enjoyed having her with them. I believe the favorite recipe at every demonstration was the Shrimp Salad Dressing—just in case you weren't at the meeting here is the recipe.

SHRIMP SALAD DRESSING

- 1/2 cup mayonnaise or other plain salad dressing (thick)
- 1/2 teaspoon grated onion
- 2 tablespoons cream or top milk
- 5 tablespoons catsup
- 1 cup shrimp diced into 1/2 inch pieces

Mix shortly before serving. Taste and add any needed seasoning. Serve on head lettuce wedges or on leaf lettuce or other salad greens.

If you care for the other seafood recipes just drop into the Extension office in the basement of the court house in Gold Beach and ask for Home Economics Bulletin Number 2012 or send me a card and I'll have one mailed to you.

Are you lengthening your skirts? Most of us are whether we like it or not. There are ways to lengthen a skirt without giving it that telltale let-down look.

If its a wool skirt that is being let down and the fabric is shiny on the underside of the hem, rip the hem and steam press it on the wrong side of the fabric. This applies if the wool is light weight or has a raised pattern in the weave. However, if it is thick wool, steam the fabric with a dry wool press cloth. Over this place a cotton cloth dampened in warm water. Use a warm iron, setting it down and lifting it up. Don't slide it back and forth. The up and down motion forces the steam into the cloth. Followed by brushing this will raise the nap of the wool. The steam pressing may also work with acetate rayon.

That's all for this week. Have a happy Thanksgiving and as keep them alive. Let's each of you sit at your well filled table remember that many people do not have enough food to us conserve by not wasting any food and by nt purchasing food we do not need.
