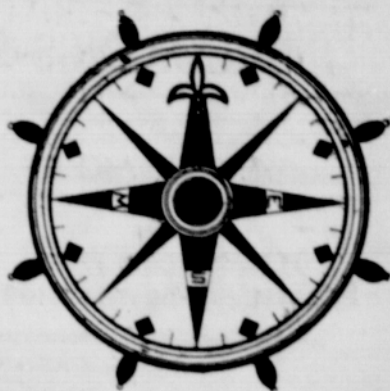

Brookings Boy Given Up For Lost, Alaska

Richard Homer Lindsley, son of Bruce Lindsley of this area, was one of the reported missing on the army transport "Clarksdale Victory" which went aground on Little Hippa island, near Ketchikan, Alaska, the day before Thanksgiving.

Mr. Lindsley told the Pilot that hope had practically been abandoned for any of the crew which were not picked up by rescue boats. Richard, a native of this area, had been in the merchant marine for one year. He was 17, last May 15.

The four which were rescued from the crew of 51 were washed ashore, to be found after the storm had subsided.

Teacher Conclave Given A "Review"

Miss Ruth Woodward, local English teacher, tells of her trip to San Francisco to attend the annual convention of English teachers. One-half of this article will be carried over to page eight.

The Thirty-Seventh Annual Meeting of the National Council of Teachers of English met in San Francisco during our recent Thanksgiving vacation. Some 2 thousand teachers registered for this convention, registration took place on the mezzanine floor of the St. Francis hotel, and, as this is the first time in history that this convention has come west of the Mississippi, the event is of particular interest to people of the west coast.

The hosts to this convention were the California Association of Teachers of English, Central Section and The College English Association of the Bay area. Location of the various sessions were all within easy walking distance of the St. Francis; special sessions were held in the U. C. Extension Building, the Women's City Club Room, the Native Sons Building, the Forum Club of California and the Methodist Church. All general sessions were held in the main auditorium of the First Congregational Church.

The theme of the convention was Realism in English Teaching.

The first general session opened Thursday evening, November 27th, and the three main speakers were Porter G. Perrin formerly of Colgate University, now of the University of Washington; Dr. Helene W. Hartley, Syracuse University; and Thomas C. Pollock, New York University.

Dr. Perrin served as president of the council for the year 1947, Dr. Hartley was formerly president of the council, and Dr. Pollock is president elect for
