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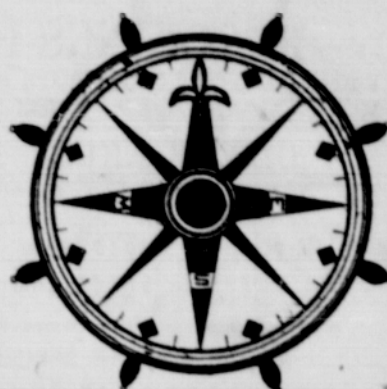

Funeral services were held at 10 a. today at Roeder Funeral Home, Crescent City, for Mrs. Stanley, of Renton, Wash., who died suddenly late Friday of a heart attack. Rev. N. J. Heford, pastor of the Baptist Community Church, officiated. Burial will follow and the body will be shipped to the old home in Renton.

Retired

Mrs. Stanley, who had recently disposed of her property with an idea of retiring to the coast, seeking a place like a new home. Cape Sebastian the couple were viewing the ocean scene, all at once, she suffered a heart attack. Sensing that she must consult a doctor, they drove southward. Near Harris Park, she told local people, she felt another pain in the region of her heart. On arrival here, about 2 p. m., they summoned Dr. J. Schmitt, who administered first aid. Resting easier, Mrs. Stanley appeared to respond, and began to make plans for the continuation of the journey. At 4 p. m. another pain hit her and attempting to rise, she died away very suddenly.

Mrs. Stanley was born at Funkston, Maryland, 18 years ago. She is survived by her husband, Frank, and two sons, Dean Allen Gerberg, of the Coast Guard, Port Angeles, and Dean Warren, of the Coast Guard, with other friends and relatives scattered over the country. 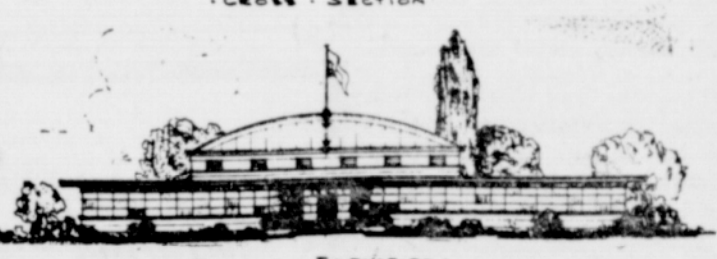
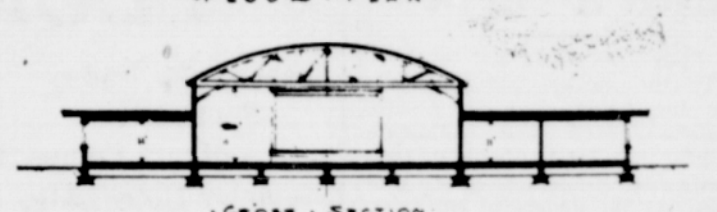
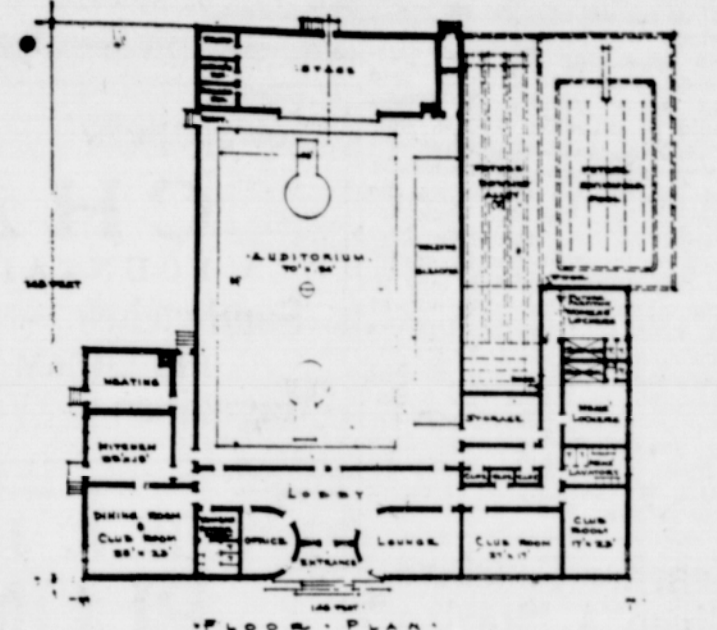
T. A. Enjoys New Projector

Local Organization Asked to Send Representatives to Meeting, Monday

That a permanent organization may be set up for erection and control of the proposed community hall, all organizations of this area are again urged to send representatives to the Thor Ask home next Monday without fail.

Last Monday, when the temporary committee called a meeting for this purpose so few attended that no action was taken, and a second meeting has been called for next Monday.

From all indication at present much of the material, as well as a substantial amount of financing has been indicated by local people and organizations. This includes timber to be used in construction, and four organizations have already budgeted \$100 each.

Membership cards to Chetco Community Club, together with bonds will be sold to everyone in the community sometime about the first of the year, it has been suggested. From this source several thousand dollars may be realized.

This hall, which will necessarily be completed "piecemeal" will also be a memorial hall for the community. The place is designed to accommodate nearly any community function, regardless of size and nature. Club rooms are available to scouts, and small clubs, and banquet and dining facilities will be available when required. Harry Lockland, licensed architect, designed this hall.

B Squad Hits Hoop

With deadly accuracy, the B squad of the Bruins hit the hoop from every angle and distance to amass a 12 to 4 lead at the quarter when Guthrie looked up and down the bench for substitutes. The smaller boys kept up the tempo to show an 18 to 8 lead at the half, although the height was missed after substitution.

In the third quarter the B squad took a jump to a 30 to 11 lead, which the second substitution in the fourth quarter did not relinquish to emerge 40 to 15 winner.

A Squad Starts Slow

Determined to salvage some prestige, the Gold Beach first string started out to show how basketball was played, and for a few moments, appeared to do just that. If either team could have shown shooting ability, there might have been a mammoth score to record. Gold Beach tallied first with a foul shot which after two minutes was submerged by a field goal, saw a 2 to 1 score at the quarter in favor of Brookings. This melted to the football score of 7 to 6 at the half in favor of Gold Beach.

Lumberman Spoke To Rotary Club

Future of lumbering in southwest Oregon was outlined and clearly defined by Freeman R. Schultz, president of the Coos Bay Lumber Company, before the Rotary club, Tuesday noon. His company now owns a substantial part of the privately-owned timber in Curry county, where operations are being extended rapidly.

Prefacing his remarks concerning early-day lumbering on the Pacific slope, the speaker told the group that lumbering was first started in the state of Washington, where poor manufacturing and merchandising methods soon exhausted the big operations which are now seen moving to Oregon.

New methods, already developed and now being further developed in laboratory experiments, have revolutionized the timber industry. Old-time methods used not over 45% of the log, whereas new methods enable about twice that amount to be saved. Elimination of this huge waste has made the Oregon coast the most profitable lumber section of the United States today.

By co-operating efforts, Coos Bay Lumber Company, said the speaker, has taken the saw timber of the plywood mills in exchange for "peeler" logs, thus extending the years of operations of each company in its particular field. Cedar is being used as battery separators and venetian blinds, using the one-time waste part of the cedar logs. Broom handles have utilized much of the edgings which formerly went into the huge sawdust burners seen at all mills.

Bark, which has always been a problem to loggers and lumbermen, is now being made into five different products. Fibre is being employed in manufacture of fireproof and kindred kinds of interior finish. As compared to methods employed as recent as ten years ago, present-day mills save three times as much of the wood in timber today.

Further saving much of the slashings in the timber is the cooperage works at Portland, which uses straight grain wood as short as two feet in length.

Southwest Oregon holds the future of the lumbering industry, and the future will show progress for every community engaged in its handling, the speaker concluded. Following his talk many questions were directed at him, which concern local area, and were answered as far as he was able.

Eight members of the Coos Bay-North Bend club were present, including Len Mayfield, president. This club sponsored the local Rotary club earlier this year, and had charge of the charter night activities, June 21.
