When we really organize, the salesmen will hunt out other profitable crops for this area. No one can sell more than the market demands.

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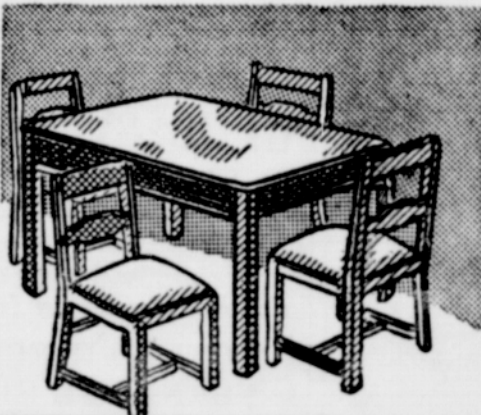
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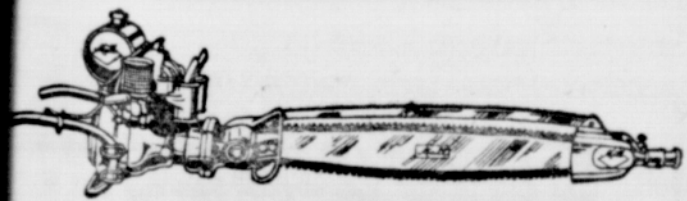
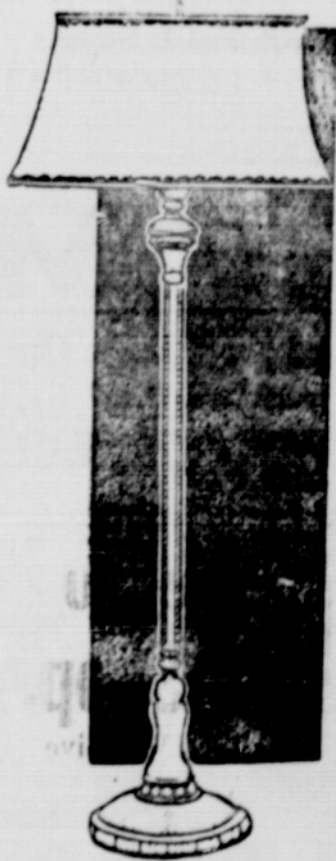
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
