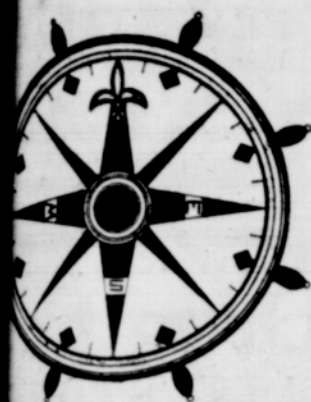
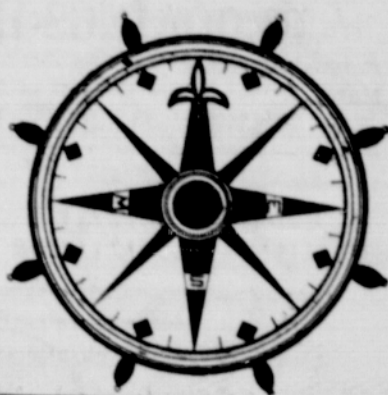

Truck and Vehicle Licenses Due On January 1st

Oregon Motor Vehicle licenses expire on December 31, with no time of grace period after that date it will be necessary for all Oregon residents to either have 1948 plates, or have adequate showing that proper application has been made for 1948.

Oregon resident drivers have an Oregon Operator's license, or out of state operators license, if the person is resident of Oregon.

Residents who have recently moved to Oregon residence will be governed by the same laws, must make proper application for 1948 Oregon Vehicle license before January 1, 1948, unless the expiration date of their current vehicle license, or 1948 Vehicle license can be shown through the County Sheriff's office at Brookings, or directly through the Secretary of State, Salem.

License examiner will be at Gold Beach on December 18, 1947. Read the manual before taking a license examination. It is not necessary to take an examination for renewals, however, do

not apply to Secretary of State for renewals unless the renewal blank is properly filled in and proper fee is known and attached to the application.

TRUCK LICENSES

All Vehicles that are being operated under PUC Permit will be licensed for a flat \$5.00 fee, for each piece of equipment. This applies to Intrastate Commerce. For Trucks, or Trailers which are not under PUC Permit, the regular rate for license will be charged.

1948 PUC Permits can be transferred with the Equipment for which it is issued, from one owner to another by being properly signed.

PUC Permits are necessary for Vehicles having a combined weight of 4500 lbs. that are operated through Interstate Commerce, in state of Oregon. There vehicles are not subject to Oregon license, but can be licensed for \$5.00 per vehicle, and, if licensed could operate Intrastate in Oregon.

Truck license fees should be filed with Secretary of State, Salem, Oregon. PUC Permits should be applied for through George H. Flagg, Public Utilities Commissioner, Salem, Oregon.
