### Surplus Farm Lands Available to GIs

SALEM—World War II veterans interested in purchasing surplus farm lands as now advertised in the former Camp Adair project near Corvallis have until December 31 to make such declaration in writing, Project Manager Thomas F. Whiteman informed the state Department of Veterans' Affairs today.

Veterans have priority after December, on the remainder of 24,000 acres of land presently being offered former owners and tenants.

Those interested should write the project manager, Box 622, Corvallis. They should give their full name and address, state that they claim priority rights as veterans "for purchase of lands as advertised Oct. 2 and Oct. 16, 1947," and request to be notified when information on the property is available so they may have an opportunity to make offer to purchase.

Within 60 or 90 days following the first of the year, these veterans will receive their notices. The project office at that time will be ready to conduct inspection tours of the lands, Whiteman said.

The land will be sold to veterans at a fixed price. Where more than one offer is submitted on any piece of property, a drawing will be held to determine the successful purchaser. Veterans' notices will inform them that they must submit 10 percent of the sale price, along with their offer.

They may submit offerings on

more than one piece of property, with only one deposit but the deposit must be 10 percent of the highest offer. Furthermore, they must be prepared to pay the balance in cash when the sale is completed. Whiteman said, because the purchase can be made on time
